### Dotty Hawthorne: Seasons Through November 28, First Gallery

Seasons create rhythms in our lives and mark the progression of time. The seasons on the Central Coast of California are subtle, but just as significant. As an artist who enjoys painting outdoors.



Dotty Hawthorne is absolutely in tune with these changes.

Dotty Hawthorne's *Seasons* captures the natural light and direct experience of the seasons with pastel landscapes that are fresh and immediate. Ms. Hawthorne's paintings have been displayed and won numerous awards in local, regional and national juried shows.

### George Jercich: Gone Fishin' November 4 – 27, McMeen Gallery



Art, space, leisure and distraction. Gone Fishin' by George Jercich is part social commentary and part autobiography. The installation includes a single mixed media sculpture of a fisherman, a fishing pole and a box...with a visual surprise. Using the entire room as a canvas, the installation is much more than what its simplicity suggests. The gallery space is revealed for what it is, a significant aspect of the work on display.

A recent retiree from the Cal Poly faculty, Mr. Jercich's influence on a generation of students cannot be overstated. As one of a group of American artists in the early 70s who broke out of traditional glass blowing to experiment in glass as sculptural form, Mr. Jercich holds company with some of the most influential glass artists in the country.

### Roger Combs: Living with Design December 1 – January 15, 2012 First Gallery



Roger Combs' furniture is best described as a combination of an Asian style with the elegant simplicity of Danish design. The aesthetic beauty of each is distinguished by seamless joinery and fine finishes. Mr. Combs approaches his responsibility of crafting furniture as a calling. He designs and carefully executes each work with the desire to create simplicity and harmony in design. Watching him study the wood, he leans in to each piece lovingly taking in the grain, color and texture. Each piece has its own voice and he listens to it, then, shapes the wood allowing the beauty of it to flow with simple design.

Roger Combs is an original designer and accomplished woodworker. He began decoupaging furniture in '77 and was able to put himself through school selling his works at craft shows. A native of Central California, Mr. Combs graduated in 1982 from the Cal Poly Industrial Arts program with a concentration in furniture design and construction. He apprenticed with the local master rocking chair artisan Richard Harrison.

Describing the images that represent the festive holiday season, the words *Dangle*, *Shine*, *Feast and Glow* all come to mind. In a new exhibit running the entire month of December, the Central Coast

Craftmakers have been challenged to bring in work that is both seasonal and appropriate for year–round enjoyment. Think ornaments, decorative fabric hangings, items for a fine table, shiny objects that delight and things that glow — oil lamps, lights, candle sticks and holders. The wonderful finely crafted objects on display are about celebration, beauty and sparkle. Each is an original design; either a one-of-a-kind or a limited edition.

### John Olt: Master of Form

John Olt (1926-2008) was a master of form whose carvings and castings of the human figure, birds, and animals recall the work of Henry Moore, an artist he greatly admired. For nearly fifty years, he created sculptures in alabaster, stone, bronze, plaster, wood, and fiberglass. His life journey was punctuated by interesting twists and turns that permitted him to utilize his immense talent in making three dimensional objects; first for the automobile industry, then for

several early NASA space missions, and later in making prosthetic devices for children with brain disorders.

When working on sculptures in natural materials, such as stone, wood, and alabaster, Mr. Olt allowed the material to influence the form of the final work. He said that nature gave him a shape in stone or wood, and he adhered to that shape, even if it meant distorting anatomical proportions. His works in steel and bronze have a more open style, meaning that the form was not predetermined by the intrinsic qualities of the material.

### **Josephine Crawford: Personal Narratives**

Josephine Crawford began her arts training at age ten at the Arts Educational School, a renowned boarding school for the performing and visual arts in London. She chose

dance as her major. Upon completion of her studies, she performed for thirty years and danced in major cities around the world. While dancing in Italy she studied painting, and continued after returning to the US at the Art Institutes of Chicago and San Francisco. Painting became her passion. When she decided to



commit to art full-time, she chose not to pursue a degree in art. She had already been painting for thirty years!

Ms. Crawford's theatrical canvases mirror her love for music and dance, the excitement of crowds, cafés and nightlife. Her dancers are earthy maidens at home in forests and fields as well as behind the footlights. She is a colorful expressionist painter using oils, acrylics, oil pastels and prints to share her energy and love of life.

Reception will be on January 6, 6 – 9 pm.

#### **Museum News**

It was announced on October 7, 2011 that the San Luis Obispo Museum of Art has received another \$225,000 Arts Regional Initiative (ARI) grant from the James Irvine Foundation.

The Irvine grants go to selected regional arts organizations in three-year cycles. In 2008, the San Luis Obispo Museum of Art, then named the San Luis Obispo Art Center, received its first ARI grant which focused on strategic planning, marketing and infrastructure improvements.

Karen Kile, the Museum of Art's executive director, states "this second ARI grant is earmarked for financial sustainability and increased cultural participation. "The Museum's Board and staff are well positioned to take on these projects because of the solid foundation laid by the past three years of capacity building funded by the James Irvine Foundation. We look forward to working again with the Irvine Foundation and our fellow grantees as we share resources, best practices and lessons learned."

This year the James Irvine Foundation awarded \$3.7 million in Arts Regional Initiative grants to 13 arts institutions in the Central Coast. Besides the San Luis Obispo Museum of Art, the organizations include the Monterey Museum of Art, National Steinbeck Center, Cabrillo Festival of Contemporary Music, Monterey Jazz Festival, Museum of Ventura County, Ojai Music Festival, Rubicon Theatre, Santa Barbara Contemporary Arts Forum, Opera Santa Barbara, Santa Barbara Symphony, and State Street Ballet.

"These Central Coast arts organizations are vital anchor institutions within their communities and provide an array of important opportunities for people to engage with the arts," noted Josephine Ramirez, Arts Program Director for the Irvine Foundation. "These grants represent our continued commitment to them as they explore new ways of achieving financial sustainability and attracting culturally diverse audiences."

The Paper is a Painting is a rare technique of paper making. Plant structures are processed into colored pulps that are used to create a piece of paper that is a painting. Susan Olsen, presents a fascinating lecture and demonstration through the entire process from growing and

harvesting source plants to creating and mounting beautiful art pieces. She has presented this remarkable presentation at The Pacific Asian Museum and LACMA and offers two-day workshops as well as several month long courses.

This informative talk will share her beginnings as an apprentice to a Japanese master in a tiny Japanese paper making hamlet in 1973. She shares the ancient tradition through stories, historical anecdotes and personal reflections. The vital focus of her teaching is ecological consciousness. She explains how to adapt the process to plants in different ecosystems and harvest source plants in a way that is beneficial to the plant itself. ### Masters of Venice: Renaissance Painters of Passion and Power from the Kunsthistorisches Museum, Vienna Tuesday, December 6, 2011

A worldwide exclusive presentation of 50 paintings by sixteenth-century Venetian painters Titian, Giorgione, Veronese, Tintoretto, Mantegna, and more, all on loan from the Gemäldegalerie of the Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna. Featured are outstanding examples of the work of these artists that were collected by the archdukes and emperors of the Habsburg family, which are among the most celebrated holdings in the collections of the Gemäldegalerie.







Key works include Titian's sumptuous Danáe (1560s), Mantegna's tortured Saint Sebastian (1457–1459) and four rare paintings by Giorgione, including The Three Philosophers (ca. 1508–1509) and Portrait of a Young Woman (Laura) (1506). Thailand, as well as selected works from Afghanistan, Burma (Myanmar), Bangladesh, China, Indonesia, Sri Lanka and Vietnam. The collection is particularly rich in art from the Indian subcontinent, including monumental stone sculpture from the Kushana and Gupta periods, and a remarkable group of Chola bronzes from southern India. Nepal. The Museum's impressive Japanese woodblock prints, the majority of which were formerly in the collection of Frank Lloyd Wright, are featured in exhibitions.


